

Pontiac Built More Than Great Cars



SN 2072. 20 MM. 54" bbl. Manufactured by Pontiac Motor Corporation (GM Corp), marked on top of receiver, "GUN AUTOMATIC 20 MM, M-39/MANUFACTURED BY/PONTIAC MOTOR DIV G.M.C./PONTIAC, MICHIGAN". This highly effective weapon was first produced in 1951 but the Genesis of the revolving cannon and the design dates back to a WWII German aircraft cannon. The M-39 uses a 5-chamber cylinder like a revolver to feed rounds from a flexible feed chute through action. An example of the feed chute is included in this lot showing the flexibility and engineering required for this gun to operate. Pontiac produced more that 35,000 of these model cannons from 1951-1975 and it was something that was the hallmark weapon of the "jet era". An example of the top of the line destructive fire power used in aviation for nearly 25 years. It was not until the modern air to air missiles that this weapon was displaced.

Jay Leno Checks Out The 1977 Pontiac Firebird From 'The Rockford Files': Video

When it comes to classic hero cars, the Pontiac Firebird from *The Rockford Files* is certainly among the most recognizable. Running between 1974 and 1980, *The Rockford Files* followed private investigator Jim Rockford, played by James Garner, as he fought crime and chased the bad guys, often executing perfect J-turns in the process. Now, Jay Leno is taking a turn behind the wheel. This particular car is a genuine piece of television history, and was meticulously restored to look like it rolled right out of the late '70s. The owner, Pat McEntee, found it listed on eBay, and despite the poor condition, he quickly realized its significance as one of the original cars from the show. What followed was 15year process, during which McEntee painstakingly restored the Pontiac Firebird

while preserving its original features.

The restoration included the unique "Rockford Gold" paint, a GM factory color originally from a 1962 <u>Cadillac</u> that was customapplied to the Pontiac Firebird for the show. The project also in-



cluded replacing worn suspension components and fixing rusted panels. Interestingly, the vehicle required a few modifications for its role on-screen. For example, the production team added support equipment for microphones and cameras to assist in the shoot, as well as air shocks to support the added weight. The show cars were delivered as Formula Firebirds, but were stripped of certain elements, like the rear spoiler and "Formula" decals.

The episodes also delve into James Garner's legacy as an actor and car enthusi-



ast. Garner was a skilled driver who often performed his own stunts, including the now-famous "Rockford," a reverse 180 spin also known as a J-turn. Of course, the Pontiac Firebird was integral to these stunts, and its durable yet stylish design made it perfect for the show's action-packed







As I've learned by working at the PTM, 1935 was the first year the hood ornament was used strictly as an ornament, and not a radiator cap and ornament combined.

All incorporate some likeness of Chief Pontiac who was well respected, but feared.

Most are made of metal with chrome plating but some are made of acrylics which was able to be lit at night for an even bolder statement.

The design in the 1930's was a native American head complete with a feathered headdress which later morphed into a memorable configuration of jet airplanes with chief Pontiac at the helm. It's interesting to note the designs usually signified the decade they were built in and what was important at the time. Everything from the planes of both wars to the country's industrial might.


